About the Exhibition

By way of one of the most impressive Austrian artistic families – the Marischkas – the major annual exhibition held at the Theatermuseum gives detailed insight into one of the most fascinating and prolific eras in the history of Vienna's entertainment industry. Beginning with the work of the two brothers Hubert (1882–1959) and Ernst (1893–1963), the exhibition pays tribute to the Marischkas' wide-ranging creative output in theatre, operetta, and revue, and to their pioneering achievements in Austrian film. Furthermore, a broad panorama of artistically committed family members and creative collaborators, including composers, as well as such costume designers as Gerdago or Stella Junker-Weißenberg are disclosed.

Whereas, owing to his *Sissi* trilogy, Ernst Marischka remains inscribed in collective memory as a film director, the œuvre of illustrious theatre impresario, operetta singer, and bon vivant, Hubert Marischka, has yet to be revisited. Acquired in 1965, his private collection represents one of the most valuable mainstays of the Theatermuseum's holdings. The occasion for the exhibition is the digital cataloguing of the estate, comprising as it does over 20,000 archive items. Presented here, among other artefacts, are photographs, sketches, original costumes, posters, and programmes from all the museum's collections. Together they present a kaleidoscopic view of the protean creative work of the two Marischka brothers. The film and audio recordings recreate the contemporary spirit in and around Vienna's stage life together with the impact it exerted on the international arena.

Ausstellungsparcours

The exhibition's panopticon opens with *Hubert's World*, featuring Hubert Marischka, whose virtuoso artistic talents ranged from operetta tenor, theatre management, inventor, and director of spectacularly staged revues during the 1920s to shrewd marketing genius, as testified by his collaboration with the Wiener Werkstätte and the Piatnik games company. Hubert's collaboration with his younger brother Ernst made itself felt in the then still nascent medium of film. Without doubt, both of them are regarded as pioneers of Austrian filmmaking in the 1910s, in which they were active as directors, actors, screenwriters, and, not least, as producers.

Ernst Marischka – whose original screenplay for *A Song to Remember* was nominated for an Oscar, and whose libretto for the operetta *Waltzes from Vienna* provided the inspirational impetus behind Alfred Hitchcock's screenplay for his eponymous film – is represented by such lesser-known works as *Matthäus-Passion* (St Matthew Passion), but also by his hugely popular entertainment films. Chief among them is the *Sissi* Trilogy (1955–57), based on the operetta *Sissy* (1932) by the Marischka brothers, to which the final section of the exhibition is devoted, and which also casts light on the long-standing legal

dispute surrounding the 'Sissy/Sissi' material. The original drafts by costume designer Gerdago are presented

for the first time and contrasted with the coronation dress worn by Romy Schneider in the movie.

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Recently retrieved Agfa colour albums of production photos and film stills as well as letters from Magda Schneider and Oskar Werner, grant insights into the film's behind-the-scenes production. The recent economic boom in the reception of Sisi is also highlighted in the final section.

Further exhibition highlights feature, among other things, the stunning reconstruction of the Viennese St. Stephen's Cathedral costume from the Marischka revue *Alles aus Liebe* (1927), and derive from costume sketches by the brilliant Stella Junker-Weißenberg. On loan, is the original coronation dress from the *Sissi* trilogy, which is contrasted with one of the original dresses of the Netflix series *The Empress*. Lotte Reiniger's silhouette animation film for the Marischka operetta *Sissy* from 1932 can be described as a real rediscovery. Finally, on display is a replica of a stage design model for the operetta *Reklame* (1929) – amalgam of Art Deco and Weimar Bauhaus – especially created for the exhibition.

A family tree spanning five generations serves as a unifying element, revealing other members of the artist dynasty and their creative work.

Selected contemporary approaches further comment on and contextualise the Marischkas' oeuvre, such as those of Christoph Schlingensief, Anna Artaker, and the Viennese club collective Rhinoplasty.

The majority of the 400-plus objects on display originates from the Theatermuseum's diverse collections. Two original, seldom shown pieces from the Kunsthistorische Museum's Picture Gallery and the Imperial Carriage Museum, are presented, among them a pair of ladies stockings from the Empress Elisabeth estate. These are supplemented by items held by the Filmarchiv Austria, the custodian of the Ernst Marischka estate, the Austrian Film Museum and the MAK – Museum of Applied Arts. A series of hand-selected loans from among the Marischka family and private collections complete the exhibition.

The exhibition was curated by Roland Fischer-Briand, Head of the Theatermuseum's Photography Collection, and film scholar Clara Huber. Mark and Hammann were responsible for the scenography and design, which reflects the broad spectrum of this artist dynasty.

There are two accompanying publications for the exhibition: *Showbiz Made in Vienna. Die Marischkas* edited by Marie-Theres Arnbom (German only) and *Fabulous Photography, Ready for the Stage*, optionally available with a limited photo edition, edited by Roland Fischer-Briand (German/English bilingual).

Showbiz Made in Vienna. The Marischkas is complemented by a varied programme featuring guided tours and workshops for children and adults, evening events, and a retrospective by Filmarchiv Austria, our cooperation partner.

For the Austrian entertainment industry, the legacy of the Marishka family is second to none. While virtuoso Hubert Marischka began his career as a singer, he went on to assume management of the Theater an der Wien in which capacity, and much to the delight of his audiences, he introduced Broadway to Vienna with dazzling, star-studded productions. His brother Ernst composed successful libretti, later achieving eminence above all as film director, the *Sissi* films being surely among his best-known works.

By way of vibrantly descriptive biographic sketches, the publication reawakens 1920s glamour and the spirited optimism of the 1950s of which the Marischka brothers were integral figures. Costume designers are featured no less than are the composers, librettists, and stars, each of whom contributed to a spectacularly imaginative era, as diverse and versatile as it was creative.

The publication includes essay contributions by Marie-Theres Arnbom, Paolo Caneppele, Christiane Druml, Lydia Gröbl, Clara Huber, Emmerich Kálmán, Günter Krenn, Barbara Lesak, Hubert Marischka, and Nicole Marischka.

Throughout the course of his career, renowned Austrian actor, operetta tenor, and director Hubert Marischka (1882–1959) documented all aspects of his work for the stage in twenty representative photo albums. This personal compendium is both reflective of the half-century of theatre history spanning the Imperial and Royal era through to the years of 1950s optimism, and outstanding testimony to the developments of stage photography. Well-known photographers and their studios (Madame d'Ora, Arthur Benda, F. X. Setzer, Willinger, and many others) provide illuminating insight into the art of portrait photography, of stage design, and of performance practice both onstage and off.

Featuring highlights from the photo albums, this remarkable compendium is supplemented by photographs documenting two spectacular revues dating from the 1920s to which Marischka contributed. Compiled and with an introductory essay by Head of the Photographic Collection of the Theatermuseum, Roland Fischer-Briand, this volume makes accessible to a broad public a wealth of hitherto unpublished materials from the Hubert Marischka estate.

This remarkably high-quality book of photographs is also available with a photo edition, with three motifs to choose from (edition: 30 prints per motif, on HM Fine Art Baryta Paper, 325g, 22 x 28 cm/28 x 22 cm).


